Last year, as we continued to re-establish our community after years of pandemic and construction disruption and welcomed many new faces on our staff and in our pews, we took as our focus for the year "To Know and Be Known," foregrounding the importance of relationships in the Christian life.

This year our theme will build on that good work and we will focus on maintaining and strengthening that community and those relationships. Our theme will be **Keeping Community**. We like that word "keeping" because it implies a holy combination of care and effort. Keeping a community takes work! And it requires you to value that community and the people in it. The work of keeping community has been fundamental to the work of the Church since its inception, and it is as important now as it has ever been. For the very presence of a community committed to staying together while honoring individual (i.e. different) people and perspectives is an increasingly rare thing in our current cultural climate. But that is precisely the kind of community we have been called to be.

As you read this brochure you will see many ways that we are going to work on **Keeping Community** this fall. But I want to highlight just a few. The first and foremost will be, as always, our worship. Our participation in liturgy binds us together no matter who we are. By coming to church regularly and participating fully, you are actively nurturing this community and keeping it whole.

Therefore, I beg you to lead a life worthy of the calling to which you have been called, with all humility and gentleness, with patience, bearing with one another in love, making every effort to maintain the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace. In our programmatic life, you will see that our adult formation sessions will begin by exploring theological reasons and practical ways to engage in civil discourse, a form of discussing and debating potentially divisive topics that does not shy away from

speaking the truth, and also asks us to listen with generosity and curiosity.

This series will culminate in the inaugural Jim Community Conversation. an initiative established after the death of beloved former Rector, The Rev. Jim Sell. You can read more about it on the following pages, but I just want to note how excited I am that we will honor Jim's legacy the renowned with spiritual writer and poet Pádraig Ó Tuama. Pádraig will be here to speak to us in late October about the great value of keeping community and how we miaht think creatively about doing that.



In addition to these programs, we will have a full slate of musical and educational opportunities for parishioners of all ages to participate in, as well as times of fellowship to nourish our community with food and fun.

I encourage you, therefore, as strongly as I can, to read through these pages and make every effort to join us for these activities and more, so that you can be a part of **Keeping Community** with us this fall as, together, we strive to live up to the calling to which we, the Church, have been called.

Jim Sell Community Conversation with Pádraig Ó Tuama

The Rev. Jim Sell, who passed away in 2022, served as Rector of Christ & St. Luke's for over 15 years. In response to his passing, Jim's family wanted to commemorate him not in stone or bronze but by starting the Jim Sell Community Conversations Fund.

This Fund is meant to be a living testament to Jim's desire to bring people together, from inside and outside the parish, to spark conversations that make a difference.

The inaugural Jim Sell Community Conversation take place on October 26 at 5:00 p.m. at Christ & St. Luke's. For this first conversation we have invited the great contemporary spiritual writer, poet, and teacher Pádraig Ó Tuama to talk to us about the value and challenge of maintaining a spirit of community in divisive times and what role communities of faith can play in holding us together when so many other forces are trying to drive us apart.

Pádraig Ó Tuama spent many formative vears in Northern Ireland, during and after that tragic period known as "The Troubles." His experience during this time of extreme division has deeply informed his ministry, especially as the leader of the Corrymeela Community in Ireland internationally renowned organization engaged in the work peace building reconciliation. His work now focuses heavily on the power of

the spoken and written word. His internationally acclaimed podcast, "Poetry Unbound," explores the human experience and opens doors into the perspectives of others in ways that only poetry can. He is the author of several books which explore the complicated and beautiful relationship between humanity and the divine, including In the Shelter and Being Here.

We are aware that the societal climate this fall will be acrimonious. In honoring Fr. Jim Sells' legacy, we wanted to hear from someone who could offer us some recourse and resources to combat that anger and that animosity and help us overcome it.

Mr. Ó Tuama is just the person to help us in that work, and we hope that you will join us for this important and timely conversation.

Keeping Community Through Music

This fall, our Sacred Music in a Sacred Space concert series will highlight the many musical talents of our church community as well as musicians from across Hampton Roads. We are pleased to welcome back the Norfolk Chamber Consort on Monday, September 30, whose ties to our parish span decades. Their program will highlight the Italian father and son composers, Alessandro and Domenico Scarlatti.

Our dedicated and faithful Parish Choir will be touring two great cathedrals next summer: Canterbury and St. Paul's, London. These two iconic and historic holy sites form the foundation of our Anglican heritage, and we will be presenting services of Choral Evensong throughout the year in anticipation of this momentous pilgrimage. Our first evensong service will be on Sunday, October 6 at 5:30 p.m. and will feature the music of local Norfolk composer John Dixon.

Audience favorite, **Dorothy Papadakos**, returns on **Friday, October 25**, for a thrilling improvised organ soundtrack to Alfred Hitchcock's first hit film, *The Lodger*. This silent film from 1927 is still considered to be one of Hitchcock's most successful productions and set the stage for his many blockbusters that would follow.

On Sunday, November 3 at 5:30 p.m., Todd Wilson, teacher and mentor of our Director of Music, Kevin Kwan, will accompany our Parish Choir in Maurice Duruflé's transcendent Requiem. This work is based on the Gregorian chants from the Mass for the Dead, interwoven in Duruflé's lush, impressionistic harmonies, and will highlight the beautiful colors of our newly restored organ. Like the last two years, this piece will be sung in the context of the Eucharist in remembrance of those loved ones we have lost.



Make Me an Instrument of Peace: A Guide to Civil Discourse

Sundays, 9:15 a.m., September 22 - October 20

Lord, make me an instrument of your peace.

Where there is hatred, let me sow love;

where there is injury, pardon;

where there is discord, union;

where there is doubt, faith;

where there is despair, hope;

where there is darkness, light;

and where there is sadness, joy.

O Divine Master, grant that I may not so much seek

to be consoled as to console;

to be understood as to understand;

to be loved as to love.

For it is in giving that we receive;

it is in pardoning that we are pardoned;

and it is in dving that we are born to eternal life.

The words of this iconic prayer, found on page 833 in our Book of Common Prayer, will frame an important conversation on the spiritual practice of civil discourse in our Fall Adult Forum. Developed by the Episcopal Office of Government Relations, "Make Me an Instrument of Peace" is designed to equip people with the tools to engage in the art of Civil Discourse—a skill that is desperately needed in our present life.

Over 5 weeks, we'll hear from presenters who are well versed in civil discourse, and learn the fundamentals of this skill in the hopes of helping us faithfully engage in the difficult conversations that surround us. We'll also celebrate the fact that churches are what are known as third spaces—spaces that are separate from our work and home lives which allow us to engage with others who we might not otherwise encounter.

What might our call be as a place of divine encounter? And how might the tool of civil discourse help us honor that call? This class will be facilitated by the parish clergy and meets on Sundays starting September 22 during the 9:15 a.m. formation hour.

October 3, 10, and 17

This class is offered twice a year (fall and spring) to help prepare baptismal candidates, their families, and their sponsors or godparents for the sacrament of baptism. Traditionally, there are four services during the year in which the sacrament of baptism is offered: All Saints, the Baptism of Our Lord, the Easter Vigil, and Pentecost. This three-session class covers the history of baptism, the spiritual gifts we receive, and the promises we make for our children and ourselves in baptism.

Take a Dip serves as the prerequisite class for those seeking baptism. If your child was baptized as an infant and learning more about baptism sounds like fun for the whole family, this is for you, too. Childcare is provided for children under 3.
