JIM SELL COMMUNITY CONVERSATION: MARGARET RENKL

The Jim Sell Community Conversation is an annual event designed to honor former Christ & St. Luke's Rector Jim Sell and his desire to bring people together, from inside and outside the parish, to spark conversations that make a difference on topics that matter.

We are pleased to welcome award winning author and *New York Times* contributing opinion writer Margaret Renkl to speak on Environmental Stewardship, Saturday, September 20 at 5:00 p.m. A reception will follow.

Margaret Renkl is one of the most graceful and powerful authors on our relationship with the natural world working today. She is the author of *The Comfort of Crows: A Backyard Year*, which won the 2024 Southern Book Prize. Her other works include *Late Migrations: A Natural History of Love and Loss* and *Graceland, At Last: Notes on Hope and Heartache From the American South*, both of which have won several environmental and literary awards. Since 2017, Renkl has served as a contributing opinion writer for *The New York Times*, where her essays appear on the first and third Mondays of the month.

Her voice is the perfect match to help us recognize and cherish the beauty of God's world and take steps to address the issues that threaten our communities, such as climate change and sea level rise. Norfolk has the highest sea level rise on the East Coast, a distinction which is no surprise to those of us who live and work here. Margaret is someone who has thought deeply about our human relationship with the natural world and has expressed those thoughts in beautiful and inspiring ways that we hope will help inspire change.

As part of the follow-up to Margaret's visit with us, we will have a series of Sunday Adult Forums with local environmental groups to showcase their work and highlight local efforts to better engage with the issues of climate change. See page 7 to learn more.

Episcopal 101

Sundays, October 5 - November 9

Episcopal 101 is a basic introduction to life and worship in the Episcopal Church. It's designed for anyone who wants to know more about what we do and why we do it, and it is highly recommended for those joining the church and coming from other traditions. We'll explore topics such as Baptism, Eucharist, liturgy, and other aspects that constitute the Episcopal identity. Episcopal 101 also serves as our prerequisite course for those seeking Confirmation or Reception. Learners from all levels of Episcopal knowledge are welcome! This class starts on October 5 directly following the 10:15 service and runs through Nov. 9.

Take a Dip into Baptism

Thursdays, October 9, 16, 23

Let's get our hands wet and learn about the sacrament of Baptism! This class is offered twice a year (Fall and Spring) to help prepare baptismal candidates, their families, and their sponsors/godparents for the sacrament of Baptism. This three session class covers the history of Baptism, the spiritual gifts we receive, and the promises we make for our children and ourselves in this sacred rite.

Take a Dip serves as the prerequisite class for those seeking to be baptized. Anyone seeking Baptism in the coming year, whether adult or child, is encouraged to sign-up. Additionally, if your child was baptized as an infant and learning more about baptism sounds like fun for the whole family, this is for you too! Childcare is provided for younger children (under 3).
